Consent Decree Update

On October 2, 2023, The Court issued an order for an <u>Addendum to the RI Consent Decree</u> (USA v RI). This Addendum is to continue the oversight of the Consent Decree and ensure all required actions are fully implemented by July 2024 and continue through June 2026. This addendum does not extend or revise the Consent Decree.

The focus is on allowing choice for individuals with I/DD and ensuring all have the opportunity to be employed and to participate in integrated community activities. The Court Monitor has provided <u>Commentary</u> to explain his reasoning for an Addendum and has outlined some of the major accomplishments that have occurred over the last nine years through the Consent Decree.

Save the Date for the Next Conflict-Free Case Management Stakeholder Meeting Thursday, October 26 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM on Zoom

RI EOHHS is leading an interagency initiative to establish a statewide effort to provide conflictfree case management (CFCM) to Medicaid long-term services and supports (LTSS) beneficiaries who are participants in the State's home and community-based services (HCBS) programs. A core component of this initiative is the establishment of a network of qualified CFCM entities with the capacity to serve approximately 11,000 Rhode Island HCBS participants who have a varying and changing array of LTSS needs.

The draft certification standards for CFCM have been posted on the CFCM page found here <u>Conflict-Free Case Management | Executive Office of Health and Human Services (ri.gov)</u> specifically under the **Program Materials** section.

Note that the public comment period of the draft CFCM certification standards runs thru October 31st, 2023.

Developing Employment Opportunities at RI College



On September 22, the DD Employment Team of Jay MacKay and Elvys Ruiz met with Maggie Sullivan, Director of Human Resources at Rhode Island College (RIC), Andreina Batista, Assistant Director of Human Resources (Talent Acquisition and Retention); Danielle Silva, Human Resources Coordinator, and Phareth Theul, Associate Director of Human Resources to talk about employment opportunities at RIC for people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD).

Jay and Elvys talked to the RIC team about the consent decree and DD's mission to support people with I/DD in reaching their employment goals, our partnership with licensed provider agencies, our business and community engagement initiatives, as well as other projects and programs supporting employment for adults with I/DD.

Maggie Sullivan expressed that one way RIC might employ people with I/DD who want to work part-time is through an option they have for temporary, non-state employee positions. These are specific short-term work assignments over a period of less than 6 months or a yearly contract.

The RIC team will keep Elvys and Jay informed of job opportunities where people with I/DD can be a good fit. Some examples of jobs and places that people have worked through this program, include the athletic facilities, kitchen, and other areas of the college.

This is a good opportunity to employ people with I/DD even if it is on a part-time or temporary basis. DD's Employment Team will be working to foster a good relationship with the Human Resource division at RIC, which may lead into better employment opportunities for people with disabilities in the future.

Parity Rule Comment Deadline Extended to October 17

The deadline to submit comments on requirements related to the <u>Mental Health Parity and</u> <u>Addiction Equity Act</u> has been extended to October 17.

In July, the Biden Administration proposed new rules to advance parity — the idea that insurance companies should cover mental health condition and substance use disorder care at the same level of care for physical health conditions. Now, the public can to comment on the proposal.

Mental Health America is asking anyone who is interested to tell the federal government how important it is to ensure equal treatment of mental health and substance use disorder care by insurance plans by submitting a comment on the proposed updates. MHA has set up a simple <u>online form</u> to help people submit a comment of support. You can also submit comments directly at <u>https://www.regulations.gov/</u>.

FTC Consumer Alert: Free COVID Test Kits Are Back: Here's How To Get Yours

Starting September 25, you can order four free test kits per household through <u>COVIDtests.gov</u>.

The tests will detect the <u>currently</u> <u>circulating COVID-19 variants</u> and are intended for use through the end of 2023. The kits will include <u>instructions on how to verify</u> <u>extended expiration dates</u>. Many kits have had their expiration dates extended beyond what may be printed on the packaging.



You don't have to pay for shipping, and you'll never be asked for a credit card or bank account number. You only need to give a name and shipping address. If you'd like an email confirmation and delivery updates from the U.S. Postal Service, you can submit your email address. **Anyone who asks for more information than that is a scammer.** So, remember:

- Only go to <u>COVIDtests.gov</u> to order your free test kits from the federal government. When you click to order, you'll be redirected to <u>special.usps.com/testkits</u>. If you're following a link from a news story, double-check the URL that shows in your browser's address bar.
- No one will call, text, or email you from the federal government to ask for your information to "help" you order free kits. Don't give out your credit card, bank account, or Social Security number. Do not respond. Instead, report it to the FTC at <u>ReportFraud.ftc.gov</u>.

CDC Recommends Updated COVID-19 Vaccine for Fall/Winter Virus Season Do you need help getting information or scheduling an appointment for a booster?



The CDC recommends everyone 6 months old and older get an updated COVID-19 vaccine to protect against the potentially serious outcomes of COVID-19 illness this fall and winter. Updated COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna are now available.

We can help you get the information you need to decide when, how and where to get a booster.

We can also help you arrange an appointment at a pharmacy, clinic or drive thru site to get your vaccination or booster. If going to one of these sites is very difficult for you, it is possible to arrange to be vaccinated in the comfort of your home.

The Quality Assurance (QA) Unit at BHDDH operates a 24 hour hotline, seven days per week, 365 days per year. Staff respond to reported incidents of abuse, neglect, mistreatment and financial exploitation.
