## Minimum Wage Update & Important Information for 2026



- Rhode Island's minimum wage is now **\$16.00 per hour**.
- This change started on **January 1, 2026**.
- The minimum wage will go up to **\$17.00 per hour** on **January 1, 2027**.

### What does this mean for you?

- If you work and get funding from Division of Developmental Disabilities (DD) and or the Department of Human Services (DHS), you **must update your Employment and Earnings Reporting Form (EERF)**.
- This form tells DD and DHS information that help you keep your funding and supports.
- Please include **30 days of paystubs** that show your new pay rate.



### About the EERF Form

- If you work and get DD supports, you must update your EERF form.
- This form tells DD and DHS about your work hours and your pay.
- Please include **30 days of paystubs** that show your new pay rate.

### When to Fill Out an EERF?

- Fill out an EERF when you get a new job.
- Fill it out when your hours or pay change, or if you leave a job.
- Use the form to ask for **Benefits Planning** at any time.
- You can fill out the form even if you are not working, just to request Benefits Planning.



You can fill out the [EERF form online](#) anytime using the [BHDDH Employment Reporting webpage](#). The form lets you upload paystubs and request Benefits Planning in one place. If you have questions or need help, [DD](#) or the [Sherlock Center](#) can guide you through the process.

### Learn About Civil Rights in Rhode Island

#### 1. Rhode Island Black Heritage Society

### Ways to Honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

#### 1. Do Something Kind

Help someone, hold a door, or say something nice. Even small kind actions matter.

#### 2. Join a Service Activity

Many Rhode Island towns have MLK Day volunteer events you can join through your program or community center.

#### 3. Learn About Civil Rights

Watch a short video, read something simple, or talk with staff about why civil rights are important. Learning helps us understand each other.

#### 4. Make Art or Writing About Fairness

Draw a picture, write a poem, or make a sign about fairness and respect. Share it with others.

#### 5. Speak Up for Yourself and Others

Dr. King believed everyone should have a voice. Practice speaking up about your needs and your rights.

## Rights Tip

Everyone has the right to make choices about their own life. This includes people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

You have the right to:

- **Make choices about your daily life.** This includes what you eat, what you wear, and how you spend your time.
- **Choose your goals.** You can decide what you want to learn, where you want to work, and what is important to you.
- **Speak up about what you want.** Your voice matters. You can say “yes,” “no,” or “I need help.”
- **Get support to make decisions .** You can ask staff, family, or friends to help you understand your options. Support should help you — not control you.
- **Be part of your planning meetings .** Your ISP meeting is about your life. You get to share your ideas and choices.



Making choices is an important part of being independent. You deserve to be heard, respected, and included.

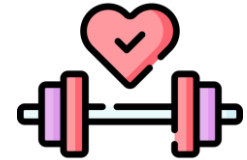
### Set One Small Goal

### Mandated Reporting

Reporting suspected occurrences of abuse, neglect, and mistreatment of individuals with developmental disabilities

To report abuse and serious incidents call the BHDDH Quality Assurance (QA) Unit **hotline at (401) 462-2629**. The hotline is open 24-hour hotline, seven days per week, 365 days per year. Staff respond to reported incidents of abuse, neglect, mistreatment, and financial exploitation.
